Are You Interested in Being a Parent Governor at One of Our Schools?

Traffic Congestion outside the School

The necessity for staggered starts at the beginning of the day, along with the two other schools that share the road, means that we have to be extra vigilant about traffic and safety outside the School. Please can we reiterate that no cars are to be parked on the double yellow lines, up on the pavement or on the 'keep clear' areas. Cars should also avoid making U-turns on Hewens Road, as this is leading to congestion in both directions during peak times.

We appreciate that these are exceptional times and that many families are not using public transport, and we kindly ask those who must come by car and are unable to walk, to be dropped off at the designated time with no waiting. Complaints have been made, thus, we anticipate that Traffic Enforcement Officers may be deployed. It is essential that we continue to work together in order to keep our community safe. Keeping Safe during Coronavirus

In order for families to remain safe, we would like to remind parents, guardians and carers that if your child has any of the main symptoms of coronavirus (COVID-19) such as **a high temperature, a new, continuous cough, and/or a loss or change to your sense of smell or taste**, please book a PCR test and stay at home until you get your test results - only leave your home to get tested. **Parents, guardians and carers should ensure that they leave children who have tested positive at home and do not attempt to bring them onto the School site to collect other children from school.** This will ensure that everyone is kept safe and limit the spread of the virus.
